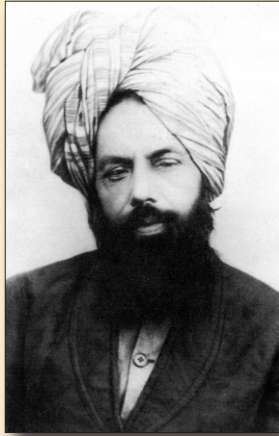

THE AHMADIYYA MUSLIM COMMUNITY



(1835-1908)

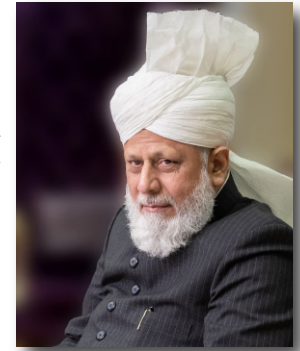
The Ahmadiyya Muslim Community, founded in 1889 by Hazrat Mirza Ghulam Ahmad (peace be upon him) in Qadian, India, claimed to be the anticipated reformer of the latter days and the Awaited One of the world's religions, taking on the roles of the Messiah and Mahdi in the latter days. His mission encompassed the revival of Islam's peaceful teachings, instilling love for God in people's hearts and emphasising duty to serve humanity.

Today, this Community has expanded its presence to over 212 countries, leading a global initiative to propagate the genuine essence of Islam, support education, healthcare in the developing world and to champion a worldwide peace campaign advocating respect and human rights for all, irrespective of colour, caste or creed. The UK chapter of the Community was established in 1913 and to-date has 150 branches, making it one of the longest-standing Muslim communities in the UK.

Since becoming the Fifth Khalifa of the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community in 2003, His Holiness has tirelessly promoted interfaith dialogue, human rights and the peaceful resolution of conflicts. His leadership reflects the Ahmadiyya motto: 'Love for All, Hatred for None,' which he embodies in both word and action. His guidance and leadership for the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community is to adhere, promote and foster such values as equality, respect and to show loyalty to one's own country.

In his extensive world travels, His Holiness frequently calls on world leaders to adopt policies rooted in fairness and justice, grounded in a moral responsibility that comes from a firm belief in God. His Holiness has delivered speeches at international forums including the European Parliament, the U.S. Congress, House of Parliament UK and peace conferences, urging world leaders to focus on justice as a cornerstone of peace backed with a strong faith in God.

In his sermons to the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community, His Holiness explains that the lack of belief in God leads to a state of unrest, not only at the individual level but also across society. When people focus solely on materialism, power or self-interest, conflict and injustice will naturally follow. The recognition of God, on the other hand, instils a sense of accountability and promotes a spirit of service to humanity. A true relationship with God allows us to see beyond our differences, embrace the values of love and justice and contribute to a more peaceful, harmonious world.

Rafiq Hayat regularly advocates for religious freedom and the struggle against injustice and intolerance and works to tackle extremism and promote mutual respect across different communities.

The Community's motto is "Love For All, Hatred For None" and Rafiq Hayat has promoted this through initiatives that bridge gaps between different faiths and cultures and helped to strengthen the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community's standing within British society.

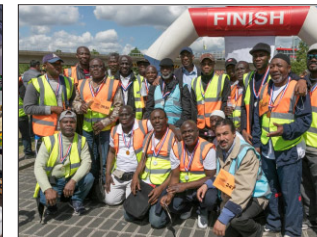
